I was born in 1892 in Málaga. I was a pioneer in the Spanish justice system, the first woman to appear before a court-martial and Director of Prisons, where I improved the conditions of inmates.

As a member of parliament during the Second Republic, I defended social rights.

During the Civil War, I helped evacuate children, and after my exile, I founded the magazine *Ibérica* in New York to keep the republican ideal alive until my death in 1987.

EXPERIENCE

AS A LAWYER:

I defended political prisoners and in 1930 I was the first woman to appear before a military tribunal.

Later, as Director of Prisons, I transformed the prisons, making them more humane and dignified.

I also fought for workers' rights and, during my exile, I helped refugees and collaborated on social issues internationally.

AS A REPUBLICAN POLITICIAN:

I reformed the prison system with a humanist approach, creating new prisons and promoting rehabilitation.

I served as a member of parliament, advocating for education and civil rights.

During the Civil War, I assisted in the evacuation of children and, from exile in New York, I fought against the dictatorship through the magazine *Ibérica*.
